In July, we might have done our craziest experiment to date. With the cooperation of the National Museum of Iceland, Eiríksstaðir, and the Fire Protection Engineering Department of WPI, we conducted a series of tests using experimental archaeology to explore the commonly used Viking-age battle tactic of attacking a man by burning him in his longhouse. It takes a village to raise a child, and it takes a village of experts to make such a grand and elaborate experiment. To conduct the test, we built a Viking house, instrumented it, and burned it. We had numerous experts in a variety of fields joining in these experiments at our <u>fire festival,</u> and we are grateful for their efforts. [preliminary report video]



As part of the events surrounding our fire festival, we held a panel discussion at the National Museum of Iceland on the topic of researching Vikings. Each of the panelists has made significant contributions in Viking studies, but each has approached their studies from different angles. In addition to the glíma training, there were lectures, feasts, a sumbl, and a sail on a Viking ship and boat. It was eye opening to see the strong warriors of OWT incorporating glíma into their Viking combat. We are grateful to OWT for their hospitality.







Hurstwic had a full schedule of lectures, podcasts, and other public appearances in 2024. Hurstwic's Reynir A. Additionally, a number of people posted videos shot at the Fire Festival, including Old Norse specialist <u>Jackson Crawford</u>. Reynir and William were interviewed on <u>Vikingology</u>, discussing the tactic of burning houses and talking about the results of our experiments.

Planning for next year's projects have begun, and even though the year has not even started it is looking very fruitful.
